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


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EDITOR'S NOTE


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

CHASING THAT PERFECT SHOT

Nature serves as the primary inspiration for these five photographers who go to any lengths for that one frame—we get a glimpse into their fascinating world as they tell us about their most challenging shoots



ROLLING IN THE DEEP

From capturing a Guinness World Record being created under ice to shooting whale sharks, underwater photographer **Benjamin Yavar** leaves no stone unturned

CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT YOUR TOUGHEST SHOT?

The one I took of Yasuko Ozeki ice freediving, as she made it to the Guinness World Record for 'Longest swim under ice with breath held' (at 126m) on 22nd February 2024, in Shiretoko, Japan. This required pushing both my physical and mental limits as the water temperature was just around 1°C.

Moreover, the dive site had only a small entrance and exit cut through the thick ice, which required precise planning and execution. The set-up and planning for each shot was extensive, as every second mattered. It took multiple dives to perfect the composition, battling the cold and ensuring safety at every step. Making sure my camera gear functioned in freezing temperatures and adjusting to the lighting conditions were critical

challenges. The photograph captures the raw beauty of the icy underwater world but also symbolises resilience and the rewards of venturing into the unknown.

WALK US THROUGH THE BEHIND THE SCENES OF A TYPICAL SHOOT.

Panglao, in the Philippines, has been my home for four years, and its vibrant marine life provide endless inspiration. On a typical shoot day, preparation begins at home, ensuring the batteries are charged and memory cards have ample storage. On the way, I soak in the tropical weather and brainstorm compositions. Sunny days bring vibrant colours, while overcast days lend themselves to moody, dramatic shots. At the dive site, I spend some time on the surface, observing the water and the life below. In a typical one-hour session,

I'll make over 60 dives, capturing images with every breath hold.

ONE PRO TIP FOR AMATEUR PHOTOGRAPHERS?

Take a freediving course or a scuba safety training session before diving into underwater photography. Understanding how to move efficiently underwater, control your buoyancy, and hold your breath (if freediving) will not only improve your ability to capture stunning shots but also ensure your safety in an unpredictable environment.

WHICH DESTINATIONS INSPIRE YOU TO TRAVEL?

Mexico, specifically Baja California, for wildlife photography. Additionally, the cenotes in Mexico are also high on my list.

TRACKING THE LAVA

About the photographer:

Jeroen Van Nieuwenhove (@jvn.photo) is a full-time Belgian Icelandic photographer, working out of Iceland. He has largely dedicated his photography to documenting the Arctic, with a special focus on volcanic eruptions and the Icelandic Highlands. Jeroen also teaches photography and is a self-published author.

CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT YOUR TOUGHEST SHOT?

That would be a single exposure of the Northern Lights above an eruption, taken in 2021. I've been documenting eruptions for four years now and it is incredibly rare to capture both these natural phenomena in one image.

One night in mid-April, I was near the eruption around 10pm; it was cold, windy and hailing. I was on my way back to the car when the Northern Lights started to show. I raced back, framed the shot, and waited for a further hour so that the Lights showed above the eruption. It was a very difficult photo to take.

WALK US THROUGH THE BEHIND THE SCENES OF A TYPICAL SHOOT.

It is very important to be conscious of safety around an eruption. Last year, Iceland experienced six such events and forced a village to evacuate. To document some eruptions, one needs permission from the government. I also wear a helmet, gas mask, and fluorescent vest, and carry a radio with GPS and a gas meter. I also use drones when it's not possible to approach an eruption safely.

I shoot both in the day and at night. But the best time is probably sunset and blue hour (twilight), when one can still see details of the solidified parts and the glow of the lava.

AN ANECDOTE YOU'D LIKE TO SHARE.

In 2021, one memorable eruption lasted six months. One night, I noticed on the webcam that the largest crater had begun flowing continuously in great volumes, which was unusual. I drove out there as fast as I could, and began flying my drone to photograph what was happening. Just 10 minutes after my first flight, the fountaining stopped completely.

ONE PRO TIP FOR AMATEURS?

For the last year and a half, there have been no tourist eruptions (volcanic events that are safe to approach). However, it is possible to do a helicopter tour. These allow visitors to see something unique—a new landscape being created in front of you. So my tip is to remember to view this through one's eyes also, and not just the camera.

WHICH DESTINATIONS INSPIRE YOU TO TRAVEL?

I am interested in isolated locations like the Arctic and theAntarctic. I also visit Greenland every year. These destinations make one feel like an explorer, where you are humbled by the grandeur of the landscape. — As told to

CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT YOUR TOUGHEST BIRDING SHOT?

That would be photographing the Himalayan monal, a pheasant bird found in the area around Chopta in Uttarakhand. I had planned this as a four-day trip, and to reach the bird's habitat, we had to trek 3 to 5km every day. It was very cold and extremely exhausting because not only was I carrying all my gear, I had also packed food and water for the entire day.

I also wanted a particular close-up shot of the monal, so I found myself scrambling over the terrain for four days, braving snowfall, hail, and rain, trying not to spook the birds and get close enough. Finally, on the fourth day, I succeeded in landing the shot.

WALK US THROUGH THE BEHIND THE SCENES OF A TYPICAL SHOOT.

That really depends on the destination, so there is no typical shoot as such. A lot of planning goes into deciding what gear to carry. For instance, for the monal shoot, I used a 600mm lens and a tele converter (a device that goes between the lens and the camera and acts as a





magnifying glass). Then, there's batteries, power banks, tripod, monopod, plus food and water. When I blog on a shoot, I also carry a gimbal plus GoPro. And in cold weather, I am usually wearing a lot of layers as well.

Sometimes, although you make all your plans, all of it comes to naught. This really came true when I tried to shoot a tigress and her cubs in Dudhwa National Park in Uttar Pradesh. I waited for hours but the tigress and cubs came out literally a few minutes after I gave up and left the location to eat breakfast. It was a disappointing moment.

AN ANECDOTE YOU'D LIKE TO SHARE.

That would be this tiger shot I took in the early morning hours at Corbett National Park, Uttarakhand. For this frame, all elements had to fall in place—the early morning mist, the location (by the river), the lighting, and, of course, the tiger. I was parked near the river, when I heard the warning call of a monkey, and though the tiger crossed the river soon after. the mist hid him from me. Also, the focus kept on changing. Then finally, just as the tiger was about to step on land, I switched to manual and got the shot.

ONE PRO TIP FOR AMATEUR PHOTOGRAPHERS?

I would really like to tell people to stop running behind birds when they want

to shoot them. It just makes them fly away. Instead, go to the location where the bird is present and wait for them to come to you.

WHICH DESTINATIONS INSPIRE YOU TO TRAVEL?

Name a forest and I would love to go there. But the last time I was excited to be in a destination was Nelliyampathy, Kerala. This is where the great hornbills mate and I was fortunate enough to witness the entire mating ritual up close. It was very beautiful to see.

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PROTECTAND PRESERVE

Be it photographing elusive snow leopards or endangered red pandas, lensman **Dhritiman Mukherjee** goes the extra mile

CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT YOUR TOUGHEST SHOT?

A shot being tough or challenging is a matter of perspective. So, I prefer to describe a situation rather than state a feeling. It was around March or April last year when I deep dived in a frozen sea to photograph a Greenland shark, one of the longest-living vertebrates in the world. They are said to live over 500 years and the one I framed was nearly 300 years old. It was a sevenday shoot; a 1.5-m-wide hole was cut on the frozen surface for entry and exit. Instead of calling this project difficult, I would say that the temperate outside was -11°C and -3°C under water.

WALK US THROUGH THE BEHIND THE SCENES OF A TYPICAL SHOOT.

In 27 years, I've worked in all Indian states and over 52 countries; therefore, I know that every shot is different; every situation is different. One day, you might be working on a project surrounding frogs in the Western Ghats and the next moment it can be a primate or a shark. So, every topography or setting is different. Less than a year ago, I was diving in a frozen sea and right now, I am in Kashmir's Baramulla district, documenting the nearthreatened *markhor* (said to

be the world's largest goat) in the Kazinag sanctuary. Shooting is a heterogenous process to me; there is no pattern to it. In fact, the more diverse your work, the more patterns you break.

ONE PRO TIP FOR AMATEUR PHOTOGRAPHERS?

There should be a purpose behind our images. What do we do with photographs? We connect with people. This connection can be of various kinds—emotional, scientific or even a means to create awareness.

Our objective as photographers, therefore, should be to connect the disconnected. Our work should aim to connect with those who are not associated with the natural world. Only then will we be able to understand, appreciate, and truly protect Mother Nature and all her children.

WHICH DESTINATIONS INSPIRE YOU TO TRAVEL?

Along with being a photographer, I also focus on conservation. So, most of my travel plans are dependent either on vulnerable species or unexplored habitats that are untapped. For example, in 2021, I shot a documentary on the largest cavefish in Meghalaya, for which I had to rappel down a 500-ft cave (approximately). Conservation work inspires me... the destination is an added delight.

CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT YOUR TOUGHEST SHOT?

It's a series of three photographs that I took of the Pampore Canal in Kashmir in three different seasons—first summer (2021), then autumn (2022), and finally, winter (2023). Shooting this as a series was not planned. I clicked the summer photo first and loved the frame, and thought how visually appealing that spot would be during the other seasons. So. I travelled back to the same location for two consecutive years to shoot. And it's been a rewarding experience.

WALK US THROUGH THE BEHIND THE SCENES OF A TYPICAL SHOOT.

Most of the time, I just set off and make my way, often venturing off onto the paths less travelled. And then when a sight or vista presents itself, my lens gets to work. But there are some destinations or locations that I decide beforehand, like the series I shot in Kashmir.

AN ANECDOTE YOU'D LIKE TO SHARE.

It was in 2021, during the lockdown, when I had undertaken a bike trip from my home in Kozhikode, Kerala, and reached Gulmarg valley. Funny thing is, in none of the state borders that I crossed, was I stopped or sent back. I just had my camera and a backpack, and was almost always covered in dust from all the riding. I did not even look like a photographer.

Every policeman that I came across, exclaimed, "What are you doing travelling at this time? Take care, be safe," and let me go ahead. And the officers in Gulmarg were no different. They even let me access the Valley; never before had I seen that expanse of green

so deserted, with only a few horses. No surprises that I shot to my heart's content.


ONE PRO TIP FOR AMATEUR PHOTOGRAPHERS?

When taking photos of people, I don't do it immediately. I spend some time with them and let them get comfortable in my presence. Only then do I click a photo. I find that this way, we can capture the most natural expressions. And when I photograph landscapes, I stay around the place and try to visit the location at different times on different days. This way, I understand at what time the landscape looks its best.

WHICH DESTINATIONS INSPIRE YOU TO TRAVEL?

Mountains and hills will always be my favourites. As someone who grew up and is settled in a humid, tropical area [Kozhikode], I love to travel to cold climates. Be it Kashmir, Himachal Pradesh or Ladakh, the natural spectacles of Meghalaya and other north-eastern states or the tea plantations of Munnar [Kerala].

"I DIDN'T CHOOSE THE SITAR, IT CHOSE ME"

At 26, Rishab Rikhiram Sharma is not only taking forward his musical legacy but also working with the UN as an advocate for mental health

CONGRATULATIONS ON BEING NAMED THE UN'S FIRST MUSICIAN ADVOCATE FOR MENTAL HEALTH. TELL US ABOUT THE ASSOCIATION

It is an honour to have been working with 'Sitar for Mental Health' and going places to spread the word about Indian classical music while opening a dialogue about mental health. I believe in doing actual groundwork and I feel blessed to have been received with such warmth not just in India but globally, including at the White House.

WHEN DID YOUR INITIATIVE, 'SITAR FOR MENTAL HEALTH', GERMINATE?

In 2020, after my grandfather's passing. I was heartbroken and it hit me verv bad. I gave up music for some time and wouldn't come out of my room. Anxiety and depression had kicked in. and then the pandemic happened. I tried talking my heart out on Clubhouse [a social audio app] and grew a community there, which advised therapy. And since I wanted a holistic approach to mental health, a doctor asked me to take up music again. And I did... I picked up the sitar and I was like, 'Where were you?' It was so peaceful, like healing. I just looked at it differently from there. Soon, I started playing on the platform and the community kept growing, with listeners sharing their stories of loss and healing. Around 2021, I started naming those sessions 'Sitar for Mental Health', and everything snowballed from there.

HOW DID YOU FIND YOUR CALLING IN THE SITAR?

I first learnt to play the guitar to impress my female fans (laughs) and also because, initially, Papa wouldn't let me touch a sitar. "You have to build respect for it," he would say. But I grew up around sitars as I belong to a family of illustrious luthiers [those who build or repair string instruments] and the first time I played was on a broken one that had come back from a shipment Papa had sent to Switzerland. He was surprised when he heard me play; I told him it is very similar to the guitar. Lessons started the next day and I haven't looked back since. I believe I didn't choose the sitar, it chose me.

YOU ARE BHARAT RATNA PANDIT RAVI SHANKAR'S YOUNGEST AND LAST DISCIPLE. HOW DID YOU BECOME HIS STUDENT?

See, the Ravi Shankar that I know now versus when I was young is very different. I knew Guruji like a household member. In fact, I held his fingers and started walking. My father used to make Guruji's sitars since 1994 and would take my brother and I to meet him whenever he came to India for his concerts. Guruji had seen a video of me playing and had immediately called my father to confirm whether it's me because he had no idea that I was playing the sitar. He asked to see me when he came to India next. It was in the winter months



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

of 2010 when I met him, and my life changed forever as he had prepared for my ganda bandhan [a traditional ceremony that marks the acceptance of a disciple by a guru]. I saw my parent's jaw drop to the floor when Guruji said, "I don't have many years left but for however long I'm alive, I would like to take Rishab as my disciple."

PLEASE SHARE SOME ANECDOTES OF PANDIT RAVI SHANKAR THAT NOT MANY WOULD KNOW.

He was a very strict teacher. If I did something wrong, he would scold me; he didn't hold back at all. But the moment he kept the sitar down, he was the nicest person on the planet. He would crack jokes. At the dinner table, he would teach me how to double and triple the speed of a beat. It was



as if knowledge was flowing out of his body. He would say, "Imbibe everything that you can; I'm not here for a very long time. You're the youngest and you have to take it forward. I know that you have it in you and that's why I'm pushing you."

DURING YOUR SHOWS, YOU USUALLY SPORT HENNA ON YOUR HANDS. HOW COME?

Kind of breaks the stereotype, right? (*laughs*) See, I design costumes [he was the brand ambassador for Aldo's campaign for two years]. So, I used to often think that when I am playing, my hands are on display and wondered how I could dress them up. I thought of tattoos but soon realised that I don't want to be married to one design. That led to a search for temporary tattoos which ended in henna. Plus, I want to break that notion that only women can wear mehendi.

WHO HAVE BEEN YOUR MUSICAL INSPIRATIONS?

Apart from Guruji and Indian classical artistes like Pandit Bhimsen Joshi and Ustad



Zakir Hussain, it would be my mom; she is a singer and my biggest supporter. She's the one who taught me *Shiv Kailash ke Vasi*, which is going viral now. But I had other influences too, like deadmau5 and Kanye West; I like Playboi Carti as well.

YOU'VE OFTEN SAID YOU WANT TO ENSURE EVERY PERSON LISTENS TO A SITAR AT LEAST ONCE IN THEIR LIFETIME.

I want to bring sitar to the mainstream. If I do that in this lifetime, my life's purpose would be fulfilled.





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Q&A Dia Mirza ATONE WITH NATURE

From sustainable practices to biodiversity protection, Dia Mirza has always championed causes to make the earth a better place for future generations

YOU ARE ASSOCIATED WITH MANY INITIATIVES TO CONSERVE THE ENVIRONMENT, WILDLIFE, AND NATURAL RESOURCES. WAS THERE A PARTICULAR MOMENT THAT YOU FELT COMPELLED TO START?

I have often traced back my close affinity with nature to my upbringing in Hyderabad. Very early, we were taught about the impact of our consumption habits on the environment. But it was while shooting *Ganga-The Soul of India* that I was compelled to do something about the vast amounts of plastic strewn in the pristine Himalayan terrain.

Working with Bittu Sehgal [editor of Sanctuary Asia and the founder of Sanctuary Nature Foundation] also gave me a clear idea about the work I wanted to do in the public domain. My role as the UN Environment Goodwill Ambassador and the United Nations Secretary-General Advocate for Sustainable Development Goals has also led me towards powerful campaigns against plastic pollution, biodiversity loss, and climate change. As an ambassador for the Wildlife Trust of India, I am fortunate to learn from and engage with our heroes working on the frontlines of climate change.

AS THE GOODWILL AMBASSADOR FOR THE UN ENVIRONMENT PROGRAMME, WHAT ARE SOME OF THE CHANGES YOU HAVE WITNESSED?

All around the world, young people are leading the conversations around climate change. I meet so many bright minds

and get to see the work being done to endorse sustainable practices, green circularity, clean energy, and biodiversity restoration. It is very rewarding when kids I have worked with grow up to be passionate defenders of tiger habitats and the environment. And it is equally fulfilling to see a positive behavioural shift in response to the campaigns I have led against single-use plastics and air pollution. Finally, it feels like a personal win when I see people carrying their own metal bottles, a practice I started over 10 years ago.

YOU ARE AN AMBASSADOR FOR THE WILDLIFE TRUST OF INDIA (WTI). HOW DO THEIR INITIATIVES IMPACT OUR NATURAL HERITAGE?

I have personally witnessed the impact we make in biodiversity protection through WTI's wildlife rescues and rehabilitation programmes. Thousands of forest rangers benefit from the training and ex-gratia programme started for families who have lost their loved ones in the line of duty, even if they happen to be daily wage labourers working in the forest. The WTI Club Nature programme that I am a founder member of, has helped inform many CEOs in India on the linkages between biodiversity protection and human health, progress, and growth.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE WAYS IN WHICH PEOPLE CAN TRAVEL IN AN ECO-FRIENDLY MANNER?

Carrying a travelling water bottle, your own cutlery, shopping bags,

and a sustainable travel kit are small ways to travel responsibly. It is also important to be a responsible tourist, not litter or pollute a place, and respect local cultures. I also look for eco-sensitive resorts and take part in restoration drives, if any, that are striving to counter the ill-effects of hyper tourism.

IS THERE ANY DESTINATION YOU HAVE TRAVELLED TO WHICH YOU THOUGHT WAS DOING A GREAT JOB AT BEING SUSTAINABLE?

I find that waste disposal and management remain a huge challenge in our country. And despite Extended Producer Responsibility being implemented, our villages, towns, rivers, and fields are choking with plastic pollution. There are parts of Meghalaya that have succeeded in implementing strict regulations that result in a cleaner environment. Indore in Madhya Pradesh is a great example of a city that has been declared the cleanest in India for seven years in a row, till 2024. The Taj group of hotels is really making strides in

ensuring their properties are singleuse plastics free.

WHAT IS IT THAT PEOPLE FIND REALLY CHALLENGING ABOUT BEING ECO-FRIENDLY?

I guess, when we discuss issues like climate change, we tend to get lost in its enormity and scale. It is true that we need far more accountability from world leaders and policy makers to reach the long-term goal of limiting global warming well below 2°C, but all of us can play a part in making the planet healthier with our choices. Something as small as refusing single-use plastics in our daily life can make a difference.

HOW ARE YOU ENSURING THAT YOUR SON GROWS UP TO BE ENVIRONMENTALLY CONSCIOUS?

Children learn naturally from the environment they grow up

in. Avyaan has always been surrounded by people who have a deep-rooted love for nature. He responds very organically to birds, butterflies, and trees, and treats them like members of our extended family. I also grew up in the same way, watching my mother nurture her garden where so much biodiversity thrived under her care.

Avyaan has already learnt to be grateful to the earth for the food he eats. He hugs trees and says 'thank you' to them, and knows the joy of walking on grass. He feels instinctively that the forest is a sacred place and lowers his voice. So yes, he is growing up into a person who cares deeply for the environment.

FOR HIS RECENT BIRTHDAY, YOU USED A NUMBER OF SUSTAINABLE MEASURES FOR THE CELEBRATIONS. CAN YOU TELL US

ABOUT SOME OF THEM?

One simple way to make any celebration sustainable is to cut out single-use plastics completely. This was a zero-waste celebration with upcycled cloth banners and buntings, sustainable napkins, reusable cups made from crop waste, bamboo cutlery and bagasse [material left over after extracting sugarcane] plates, and water dispensers with filtered water. The party favours for the kids were local and sustainable, and trees were also planted in their names in Uttarakhand.

FINALLY, WHAT IS IN THE CAREER PIPELINE FOR YOU IN 2025?

As an artiste, it is always my endeavour to represent empowered women on screen. So, 2025 promises to be yet another year where purpose and passion will guide my choices.



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ravel, for me, has always been an exploration of the senses. Over time, my travel style has evolved into something slower, more intentional, and focused on immersing in the experience. While I still aim to tick at least one item off my bucket list each year, I no longer chase whirlwind itineraries. Instead, I prioritise more meaningful getaways.



CULTIVATING A TRAVEL SENSIBILITY

Work has shaped my travel and now, the reverse is true. After over a decade in environmental consultancy, I transitioned to running a hydroponic farm and creating a food brand. A tribute to South India's heritage recipes, the brand is inspired by my travels and fascination with local ingredients and food history.

Over the years, I've developed a keen sense of travel sensibility. Ethical wildlife tourism is nonnegotiable—any tour promising guaranteed animal sightings is a red flag. I also engage with

These conversations often reveal hidden gems far beyond guidebooks. Nature-focused trips always draw me in—these moments aren't just about escape, they're about connection, awe, and affirmation that fuel both my work and life.

BECOMING A CONSCIOUS TRAVELLER

Travel is more than just about the places we visit, it is about how we engage with them. My approach is rooted in sustainability and sensitivity.

Respect wildlife and local communities: Be mindful of local customs, religious sensitivities, and dress codes. Dispose of waste responsibly as much

of it ends up in the ocean, harming ecosystems. When interacting with wildlife, support operators that respect animal welfare. Support local culture and cuisine: Take a cooking class, visit a market or explore neighbourhood shops. Bring home local spices or unique souvenirs, and support artists and businesses. If you enjoy a particular activity, find a club and join a session. Learn about the history of your destination or read a book related to the place to spark conversations there. Journal, plan, ignore the FOMO: Plan with intention but allow room for spontaneity. Even if you're not into journaling, take time to jot down thoughts or sketch your surroundings. Remember that social media

often showcases unrealistic expectations. Embrace your own unique experiences and savour the moments that matter to you.

Be an ambassador for your country: This mindset starts the moment you board the plane. Learn about your country and its culture to represent it with pride and accuracy. This year's Fair lays emphasis on not just paintings and sculptures but also textile art, photography, innovative installations, performing arts, and other artistic practices. In conversation with Jaya Asokan, Fair Director, India Art Fair, we bring you a list of not-to-be missed.



Ġ AYESHA SINGH

Contemporary artist Ayesha Singh, cofounder of Art Chain India, is designing this year's main façade. Titled Skewed Histories and Site Lines, it engages with Singh's research—women's

contribution as architects from 1000 AD to their work during the modernist era. Challenging their erasure in history, this new work honours their stories, shifting long-perpetuated perspectives towards reimagining collective horizons.

UMESH S

Recipient of India Art Fair's artist-in-residence programme, Umesh's art revisits his connection with his village in Bihar, drawing on memories of his childhood as he captures his agrarian roots through drawings, photographs, videos, and installations. He combines vernacular text and poetry in wooden panels and on forgotten agricultural tools as a reminder of the changing rural landscape.



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O CLAIRE FONTAINE

This is a feminist conceptual artist collective founded by Fulvia Carnevale and James Thornhill in Paris in 2004. The collective comes to India Art Fair with *Foreigners* Everywhere / Stranieri Ovunque, a project that began in 2004 as a series of neon sign sculptures spanning multiple languages, capturing the nuanced meanings of texts embedded throughout site-

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specific LED installations. This year, Claire Fontaine presents a new set of installations drawing from India's languages, influences, and culture. The project will also have multiple installations across New Delhi.

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ASIM WAQIF

Delhi-based Waqif's art practice attempts a crossover between architecture, art, and design, with a contextual reference to contemporary urban design and the politics of occupying public spaces. This year, Waqif brings forth his concern for ecological management, especially with respect to water, waste, and architecture. His work, *Make-Shift*, uses a second-hand cement truck from a chassis fabricator and metal scrap to show both the temporariness and the rigidity of various materials.



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G HIMALI SINGH SOIN

This writer and artist based between London and Delhi, uses metaphors from outer space and the natural environment to construct imaginary cosmologies to understand human psychology, focusing on ideas of nostalgia, love, and loss.


Engaging audiences through audio-visual commentary in immersive environments, Soin, currently writerin-residence at the Whitechapel Gallery, London, brings *Hylozoic/Desires: The Hedge of Halomancy*, a multimedia showcase that combines performance, moving images, and music, to tell viewers about a forgotten border, the Inland Customs Line, while exploring themes of colonialism and nationalism.

😃 YAYOI KUSAMA

The Japanese artist's work has transcended two of the most important art movements of the second half of the 20th century: Pop Art and Minimalism. Her highly influential career encompasses paintings, performances, installations, literary



works, films, fashion, design, and much more. This year's India Art Fair showcases Kusama's various works, including *My Evanescent Dream Within a Dream* (2022) made with mirror boxes and LED lights.



YOGESH BARVE

Yogesh Barve, a contemporary artist from Mumbai, employs found objects related to technology in his multimedia installations. His work examines social and cultural experiences of equality and inequality, and how it feels to be both an outsider and insider. *I Am Not Your Dalit*, an installation he brings to this year's edition, questions societal stereotypes by reimagining objects like LED tickers from railway stations. The work highlights issues of access to education, technology, and marginalised histories.

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

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

A GILDED PAST

The chance discovery of a sport led to a lifetime of trips exploring the history, art, food, and culture of Melbourne

Д

ustralia's first steampowered trains puffed along the rails in Melbourne and in the 1880s, construction

began on a huge tram network. On my first visit to Melbourne in 2016, I took a free ride on a No. 35, one of the vintage 'rattler' trams that loop around the CBD (Central Business District). I saw a modern population and contemporary buildings, but also the grand architecture of buildings like the **Parliament House** and the **Old Treasury Building**, where gold was taken for safekeeping.

Years later, on my umpteenth trip since that first one, I get off the tram at Flinders Street Station, an unmissable landmark and a good place to start your explorations. Right opposite is Federation Square, with its compact but diverse collection of museums. The first multimedia presentation using moving pictures happened in Australia in 1900, and shorts and slides from Soldiers of the Cross feature in ACMI, the national museum of film culture, which follows Aussie films up to present-day blockbusters. There is also the Ian Potter Centre. home of the Australian collection of the National Gallery of Victoria, and the Koorie Heritage Trust, which aims to nurture, honour, and celebrate the Aboriginal culture of south-eastern Australia: their delicate, colourful feather flowers alone are worth going to see.

Earlier, I had done an online search about Melbourne and discovered a strange game called *trugo*, which is played by about 10 local teams, but nowhere else in the world. So, from Flinders Street I board a train to **Yarraville**, a suburb some 25 minutes outside the city. Apparently invented by a bored Yarraville railway worker in the late 1920s using only what he had at hand—mallets and the rubber rings used as buffers—it was a kind

Best time to visit

of bizarre, reverse croquet. Now, over 90 years later, I was going to visit the Yarraville Club for one of their afternoon training sessions. Their star player and captain, 85-year-old John McMahon, met me at their neatly mown grass pitch, which had a grey wooden clubhouse alongside.

Trugo was brought into public parks by railway retirees and as John selected a wooden mallet for me, he explained that it takes a minute to learn but a lifetime to master. I was instantly addicted and have been the only international member of the Victorian Trugo Association ever since. Meeting my teammates has been the first thing I arrange on every trip since.

Travelling back on the tram, I make a list of the best places to sample the



local fare. For gourmet chocolates, it's the 110-year-old **Haigh's** inside the Art Deco **Block Arcade**, one of the several markets that feature domes, stained glass, mosaics, and marble friezes; for the best steamed dumplings and dim sum it's **Shark Fin Inn** in Chinatown; **Punch Lane** is great for lamb and duck.

Whenever I visit a new city, I also try to find out what the locals like to do. I quickly learned that Melburnians all shared one thing: an addiction to coffee. The flat white (espresso with steamed milk) became popular in Australia back in the 1980s, though that was long after it had been a favourite of Melbourne's Italian immigrants. Despite being an avowed tea-drinker, I became very fond of the flat white, especially from **Pellegrini's**, a neon-lit coffee bar, some 70 years old. The Italian brothers that opened it were said to have bought

the first espresso machine to Australia. Even small corner bodegas offer good brews, as do high-end restaurants like **Cumulus Inc.**

It's worth looking down every alley and side street, too. Melbourne is famous for its street art, which ranges from celebrating Aussie rock band AC/ DC to towering and elaborate murals, with the **Upper West Side Street Art Precinct** an official starting point.

Also, I have always been told it's best to go early to the 17-acre **Queen Victoria Market**, to see produce you've

The country's longest-running, largest free-community festival is family friendly and features everything from fireworks displays and live music to water sports. In March; moomba.melbourne.vic.gov.au

Melbourne Food & Wine Festival 2025

This hosts talks by winemakers, pop-ups by internationally-acclaimed restaurants, and ticketed lunches by iconic chefs. 21st-30th March; melbournefoodandwine.com.au probably never seen, and artisan goods, including kangaroo meat. There is an array of savouries too—from doughnuts and savoury Ottoman pies known as *böreks* to Korean spiral-cut potatoes, fried and served on a stick, and more.

Finally, if *trugo* isn't for you, check out another of Melbourne's quirks, the **Coop's Shot Tower**. Built in 1889, this 50-m-high thin brick tower (with a flanking lead pipe and shot factory building) made bullets until 1960 and the tower stands under a cone-shaped glass roof in the **Melbourne Central Shopping Mall**. However, if you do decide to give *trugo* a shot, head to Yarraville—you won't be disappointed.





even richer as an experience when I keep it independent of why I went.



As I entered, besides the warm welcome and *tika*, the first thing that hit me was the sound of the gushing river. I didn't even check in, instead I sat on the deck, drinking my masala chai. Much later, I went to the room, dumped my stuff, and rushed back out because I didn't want to miss a single daylight

moment. Later, I attended the *aarti* the hotel staff conducted on the banks of the magnificent Ganga.

I called Vipul (my husband) when I reached, to show him the place, but he was in a meeting, so I sent him pictures. I would've loved to share this experience with my family, but though they weren't there, a calmness had settled within me and I was unaffected. I wasn't thinking, I was just being. A place like this demands to be surrendered to. I would've been a fool if I hadn't.

THE PEACE

It was so serene and quiet, barring the constant roar of the Ganges. I was content,

raft. Originally, the rafting stretch was from the hotel till Shivpuri but when I reached that point, I wanted to do more, so I went all the way to Rishikesh. The rafting between Shivpuri and Rishikesh is level 4-4.5. It is an unbeatable experience surging with the Ganges, with the rush of water filling your being. You have to experience it. I'd do it again in a heartbeat. This wasn't my first time rafting, but this is where I did it for the first time and it had been on my to-do list since.

THE LEARNINGS

An experience like this hasn't left me fulfilled. It has left me craving for more. Every bit of this trip is so memorable, I wouldn't change anything about it. And it ended beautifully too. On my way to the airport, I saw a puppy by the road, so I sat on the footpath and played with him till it was time for my flight.

My biggest learning is that I can do it alone—I must and I will. I wasn't sure I would be comfortable on my own but now I get that being alone is not synonymous with being lonely. I would love it if my family or friends could join me but if they can't—I'm good enough on my own. Secondly, not being selfless does not mean being selfish. There is an in-between path where everyone is equally important and everyone is entitled to the same choice, freedom, dreams, and happiness. There is ample space for everyone; if there isn't, nudge your way and make your space. You deserve it. Thirdly, as children, we were taught to sacrifice, to let go. I don't want my kids to sacrifice and let go of things they rightfully deserve. I saw my parents be selfless but it can't work in today's world.

Lastly, remember the bucket list vou made as a kid? Don't rubbish it no matter how crazy it sounds. Dig it out; when you find yourself alone or empty, you won't have a better partner than yourself to open it and pursue it. You may not be able to climb Mount Everest as you had imagined but you can go to a place from where you can see it and be inspired to paint it. Whatever it is, do it. Because there truly are miles to go before we sleep.

THE HEART OF OLD DELHI

Whether you are a resident or a transit traveller in the capital, Chandni Chowk is a satisfying sensorial experience, not to be missed

s far as l can remember, I have never started my morning with a jalebi. But when you're in Chandni Chowk. no rules apply. You step off the Delhi Metro, take a deep breath, and get ready to embrace the beautiful chaos that is this market. As we meet Anoushka Jain. a postgraduate in history and the founder of Enroute Indian History, who is taking us on a curated walk, we realise immediately that vou cannot have an agenda here. So, when the Old Famous Jalebi Wala shop comes first. vou start with a bite of the most delicious, freshly-fried jalebi that isn't saccharine sweet.

Jain starts by telling us a little about the **Sri Digambar Jain Lal Mandir,** the starting point of the walk, after we step inside for a quick *darshan*. With fluted columns, copper plated ceilings, and inlay work, it offers an interesting insight into India's past one that has amalgamated many cultures, art, and architecture styles. It also operates a charitable bird hospital within its premises.

Air India offers travellers from North America and Europe convenient onestop connections to destinations in Australia and Southeast Asia via its hub in Delhi. Interestingly, Chandni Chowk also houses the **Gurudwara Sisganj Sahib**, **Gauri Shankar temple**, **Central Baptist Church**, and **Jama Masjid**, all of which nod to India's secular fabric. The Jama Masjid, built on a natural hill, stands tall in red sandstone and white marble. From the top of the southern minaret, you can get a bird's-eye view of the entire Chowk. We enter from the North gate, after



walking through Kinari bazaar (laces, borders, rivets, sequins for outfits, embroidered potlis, and gift bags); the South gate is where all the delectable kebab restaurants are; the West has Chawri bazaar (brass, copper, and paper in wholesale) while the East gate looks straight at Lal Qila or the Red Fort. In yesteryears, people would sit at the Masjid's entrance steps, as acrobats would regale them and dastangoi recitals would take place; the market had kehwa khanas (tea shops) and tall trees, with the Yamuna flowing through—a bygone era.

We stroll through **Dariba Kalan**, checking out silver, and admire the carved doors at **Naughar** (nine houses), a cul-de-sac where the facades are as they were. We buy sesame barfis and savoury delicacies from Sharma Namkeen Bhandar, and finally hit Paranthe Wali Gali for parathas at Pt. Gaya Prasad Shiv Charan. Try the bitter gourd, lemon or green chilli versions: they also have a banana paratha. For choley bhature (chickpeas and fried flatbread), head to Kanwarji Raj Kumar Bhatura Junction. For dessert, go to one of the oldest establishments, **Ghantewala Confectioners** (1790) for the Pista Lauj (pistachio dessert) and White Carrot Halwa. Also try palak patte ki chaat (spinach chaat).

The day has been rich with history and anecdotes, street food, and shopping, but in Chandni Chowk, yeh dil maange more.

"The Ganga *aarti* at Triveni Sangam is the spiritual heartbeat of the Maha Kumbh. Much has been said about the event's inclusive nature and I caught a glimpse of it first-hand. Most *aartis* I've attended have been performed by male priests but this time, I saw a few women, draped in brocade silk sarees with their hair neatly tied in a bun with *gajra*, as equal participants in the spiritual act. FLORAL PARADE

Travelling to watch wildflowers bloom is a rising trend. Here are some locations around the world where one can see such panoramas unfold

A FOREST OF RHODODENDRONS

Come February, and there's a profusion of red and pink in the upper Himalayan forests. It's the rhododendrons; they bloom between late February and late April in different regions, including Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, North Bengal, and Sikkim in India, and Nepal. With about 87 species in the Indian Himalayan region, there are several treks that you can take (Goechala in Sikkim, for one) to see these trees at their finest. While red is common, some of the other varieties are blue, pink, and orange.



▲ A PLATEAU OF SMITHIA

A UNESCO World Heritage Site, Kaas Pathar, also known as Kaas Plateau, in Maharashtra, India, is home to some rare endemic flowers and becomes a riot of colour between August and October when the many species of wildflowers bloom. Some of the varieties include Topli karvi, Drosera indica, and Smithia hirsuta, commonly known as the 'Mickey Mouse' flower. Spread across 1,000 hectares, this is a floral wonderland.



A ROWS OF CHERRY BLOSSOMS

The hanami (flower viewing) season of the sakura heralds an air of festivity in Japan, and is considered a time to socialise under the cherry trees. While the earliest blooms are reported around late March, the season goes on almost till May, with the last blossoms appearing in Hokkaido. Japan's most famous cherry blossom destination is Yoshino, where thousands of sakura trees cover the Kii Mountains. Significantly, the bloom's short duration is seen as symbolic of life, death, renewal, and the transient nature of being.

With views as perfect as a painting, Central Texas is known for its abundance of wildflowers. Bluebonnets, evening primrose, winecup, red yucca, Carolina larkspur, Indian paintbrush, Mexican poppy, horsemint, and verbena–you'll find them all claiming their own space yet melding together in a beautiful tapestry. Home to hundreds of species of native Texas plants, a good place to view them is at the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center or on a drive along the Willow City Loop near Fredericksburg.





FIELDS OF POPPIES

The enchanting plains of Castelluccio di Norcia in Italy's Umbria region bloom mid-year as daisies, violets, poppies, cornflowers, lentils, narcissus, gentians, and other species carpet the plains, making them come alive. In order to preserve the fields and not to use pesticides, the farmers allow other plants to thrive, facilitating this annual floral spectacle. The star flower is the lentil, a small white bloom with purple hues.


