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



















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






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CEO'S MESSAGE



amaste, and welcome aboard! January 2025 marks the third anniversary of Air India's return to the Tata Group, and the mid-way point of our five-year Vihaan.Al transformation programme aiming to create a world-class, global carrier with an Indian heart.

Air India's transformation covers every aspect of our business, and involves significant upgradation of systems, processes, infrastructure, equipment, and people. While the journey still has a way to go, some significant milestones have been achieved.

More than 9,000 new Air Indians have come aboard and, together with their colleagues, have undergone completely redesigned service training programmes at Air India's newly-opened training facility in Gurugram which, at 800,000 square feet, is South Asia's largest.

More than 100 new aircraft have been deployed, including India's first Airbus A350 aircraft now flying from Delhi to London and New York. These are part of the one-third of our twin-aisle fleet that now sport modernised interiors and entertainment systems, with the remainder of the fleet progressively undergoing similar upgradation over the next two years. Interior refit of the single-aisle fleet, serving domestic and

short-haul international destinations, is already well underway, and will be complete by mid-2025.

The merger of the four Tata airlines into one fullservice airline, Air India, and one low-cost carrier, Air India Express, was completed in late 2024, and the erstwhile Vistara aircraft are now deployed on metroto-metro domestic routes and to key international destinations such as Frankfurt and Singapore to ensure a consistently high-quality experience.

These mergers and new aircraft deliveries have taken our Group fleet to 300 aircraft, allowing us to now expand our reach to over 100 destinations in India and around the world. Air India's global coverage will further increase in the years ahead, not least because of the recent addition of 100 aircraft to our orderbook, augmenting the earlier commitment for 470 made in 2023. These new aircraft will be supported by a brandnew 12-bay maintenance facility and maintenance training school in Bengaluru, a new 34-aircraft flight school in Amravati, and the aforementioned training academy in Gurugram, underscoring our commitment to strengthening India's aviation ecosystem, not just

Multiple customer-facing initiatives have been deployed, including upgraded inflight catering, new amenities, and the rollout of streaming entertainment on all aircraft. Our frequent flyer programme, renamed Maharaja Club, has been completely revamped and now serves over 10 million members, while our industryfirst generative AI chatbot AI.g has garnered global awards. A new lounge for travellers in premium classes has opened at Bengaluru and will soon be followed by another in Delhi during 2025, and in other key cities in time to come.

Air India has covered a lot of ground in the period since privatisation; we acknowledge there's much more to be done. All 30,000 Air Indians are fully committed to improving the quality and consistency of our services, in all areas, so that Air India becomes the world-class airline we all want it to be.

Thank you for your patience and continued trust as we pursue this transformative journey, and thank you for choosing to fly with us today.

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
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EDITOR'S NOTE

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

he last rays of sunlight streaked the sky pink and orange. As the sun sank behind the towering mountains, I returned my gaze to the roaring Tirthan river. Sitting by myself on a large rock on its banks, I closed my eyes for a few minutes. The sound of the flowing water and distant chirping of birds filled my ears. The earthy aroma of the outdoors filled my nostrils. I felt the smooth rock below my palms, shaped by centuries of wind and water. Opening my mouth and inhaling, I tasted the air on my tongue, refreshing like rain on a warm day. When I opened my eyes again, the world felt like a different place, one that I had just experienced with all my senses instead of just my eyes. In the vast wilderness of India's Great Himalayan National

Park—in Himachal Pradesh's Kullu district—I had hoped to catch a break from the constant noise in my life: digital devices, traffic, people, and my restless mind. But as I sat there, it struck me that I didn't necessarily need silence. I needed the quietening of artificial noise, so I could feel the world around me more deeply.

Growing up as an introvert in a world that wouldn't stop talking, I found my refuge in writing. That led me to a career in travel writing and digital storytelling, and opportunities to spend time in some of the world's farthest, remotest, quietest places. It also redefined how I understood the concept of 'quiet'. Quietude, to me, isn't devoid of sound. It is filled with the music of the natural world that I either forget to notice or drown out with man-made sounds. It enables mental silence,

my rock in solitude, the contrasting realities of the scenic Great Himalayan National Park and the communities that live on its fringes sparked an idea: the voices of these women and initiatives that help them build climate resilience through tourism need to reach a wider audience. That gave birth to my first series of short documentary films titled Routes of Resilience.

Time and again, I've found that quietude nourishes my creativity, builds mental stamina, and reminds me of my purpose. Sadly, many of us reject it, filling our excursions into the outdoors with loud music or unnecessary banter. Perhaps the idea of silence feels daunting when our lives are filled with mental, physical, and digital noise. In 2025, why don't you take a 'quietcation'—while supporting a local community—and embrace the mental silence. You might be surprised by the new paths it compels you to walk on.

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so I can filter the clutter in my mind and reach my innermost thoughts.

As stars slowly filled the darkening canvas above, I heard my calm heartbeat. Thoughts ebbed and flowed, following the rhythm of the river. I recalled the six kilometres I had trekked, huffing up hills, walking across rickety bridges, crossing stunning oak and walnut forests, foraging for wild vegetables like lungdu (fiddlehead fern, that we'd cook at our camp later), and drinking water from mountain streams. I thought of the conversations en route with my unlikely trekking guides, porters, and chefs—

comprising the region's first collective of rural female guides. These women hail from mountain families and, with the support of community tourism organisation, Himalayan Ecotourism, are literally blazing new trails. They're the first in their families not just to work outside their homes but also to work in a profession dominated by men. We talked about the anticipation of winter snow and the impact of erratic weather patterns on agriculture. I gathered that climate change impacts are showing up even in remote, self-sustainable Himalayan communities. Sitting on

ate last year, my St. Helier-based friend (a soul I've known since we exchanged crayons in kindergarten) bundled her whole family for a trip to Bath, the UK. 


where fans who didn't get tickets in their own cities, booked concerts in other parts of the world.

GETTING THERE Fly to Dublin with Air India's Interline Partner, British Airways. t's always better to get as close to the true flavour of a country to experience its true essence. In that spirit, choosing a small city instead of a bustling metropolis appears to be a smart choice, one that many visitors seem keen to exercise. Smaller towns can also be more economical, as



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AN ODE TO HER ROOTS

Actor and filmmaker Nandita Das on how the food of Odisha stands out for its simplicity

aipur, 2018—I saw Nandita Das for the first time, amidst a sea of people at a literary event. I listened with rapt attention as she spoke, with unbridled passion, about her latest directorial venture, *Manto*.

Cut to November 2024, I see her again in Delhi; talking about a whole other subject—food. There is, however, no mistaking that same passionate tone in her voice. "Many people think I am Bengali because of my surname but I am part Gujarati and part Odia—and a complete foodie," she says with a smile, introducing me to Odia cuisine.

As we savour soulfilling bites of chakuli pitha (rice-based pancakes) and dalma (traditional lentil stew) with a mouthful of crunchy badi chura (mashed sun-dried lentil dumplings), Das points out how the cuisine stands out for its simplicity and emphasis on seasonal ingredients. "It has its own ingredients and a unique way of cooking them," she explains, adding, "For instance, badis, which are present in

other cultures, are eaten with saag [spinach] or as a side. Pounding it with raw mustard, garlic, onion, and green chillies makes for a wonderful accompaniment. Odia cuisine is about showcasing the natural flavours of the ingredients without overpowering them with excessive spices or elaborate techniques. I like that it's a cuisine that is both healthy and flavourful, reflecting a deep connection to the land and its seasons."

Growing up in Delhi, Das' fondest memories of relishing traditional flavours date back to summer holidays when her father, Padma Bhushan awardee artist Jatin Das, would take her to his hometown in Baripada, located in Odisha's Mayurbhanj district. "My memories of visiting my grandmother are vivid. I remember how she would just throw vegetables like aloo [potato], parwal [pointed gourd], and baingan [aubergine] into the chulah [earthen stove]. Once grilled, raw mustard oil, onion, garlic, and green chillies were crushed and added, enveloped in wood-fired





"In the summer, when I would visit Odisha, it was always during the Ratha Yatra. The temple bhog is delicious. Even their simple khichdi and vegetables used to be, and still are, so flavourful. And there are several varieties of pithas; arisa pitha (sweet pancakes) being one of them. I brought back some when I went home recently.'



aroma. She had a way of making even the simplest dishes taste extraordinary," reminisces Das.

I ask about her favourite dish. "Too many," she exclaims, and then says, "I would say the staple pakhalo [fermented rice]. The other dish I likebecause it is my father's recipe—is dahi baingan, fried eggplant with yoghurt and seasoning."

Making our way through delicious besara maachha (river sole with mustard), dahi kukuda (spring chicken with yoghurt), and more, we reach one of Odisha's most unique desserts—chhena podo (baked cottage cheese).



"This has a caramelised crust and a rich, moist texture that is delightful," she beams with pride, not forgetting to mention that her son Vihaan, too, loves Odia cuisine.

The best places to try such delicacies, says Das, are still Odia homes. "Maybe because the cuisine hasn't really been marketed, it also hasn't got corrupted." As we wrap up, here's hoping the flavours and aromas of this cuisine soon venture out of the state's boundaries to reach gastronomes worldwide.








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








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

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Q&A Zubin Mehta

"MUSIC CAN SOOTHE AND HEAL WOUNDS"

The legendary conductor on the role of music in world peace and his passion for Mumbai, history books, and cricket

HOW CAN ONE CAPTIVATE THE YOUNGER AUDIENCE AND CULTIVATE A LOVE FOR CLASSICAL MUSIC IN THEM?

All orchestras have children's concerts that are used to cultivate a new generation of classical music enthusiasts. These events aim to create an enjoyable experience, encouraging children to return and, potentially, become lifelong patrons of classical music. To achieve this, specialist conductors employ creative strategies to captivate young minds and foster a love for this genre of music.

DO YOU REMEMBER YOUR FIRST CONCERT IN MUMBAI WITH THE LOS ANGELES PHILHARMONIC?

How can I forget that? It was in 1967 and it took three hours to drive from the Taj Mahal Palace, Colaba, to Shanmukhananda Hall in central Mumbai. It was Diwali night and the loud bursting of crackers outside could be heard in the concert hall, even though we were playing in a special acoustic shell. The musicians were startled by the noise (laughs).



IN THESE UNCERTAIN TIMES, WHAT POSSIBILITY DOES MUSIC OFFER FOR SOLACE AND CONNECTION?

People don't understand how powerful music can be. We have played in war-torn areas and people have turned up in huge numbers. In 2013, we went with the Bavarian State Orchestra to Kashmir where everyone sat together and watched the concert without fear. It's one of those concerts that I can never forget. In 1994, I performed at Sarajevo. I also played in Israel to a full house. So, don't underestimate the power of music. It can bring people together. It can soothe and heal wounds.

YOU HAVE CONDUCTED SOME OF THE MOST RENOWNED OPERAS AND ORCHESTRAS OF THE WORLD. DO YOU HAVE ANY UNFULFILLED AMBITIONS?

I have never conducted German composer Richard Wagner's Parsifal, which is strange as I have

led opera houses for years. But given my age, I wonder if I'll ever get around to it.

WHAT DO YOU MOST LOOK FORWARD TO WHEN IN INDIA?

I look forward to meeting my friends and eating lots of Parsi food, especially cutlets. I visit my old home in Cuffe Parade, Mumbai, and meet my childhood friends, including Cipla (Non-Executive) Chairman, Dr YK Hamied. Growing up, we would meet every evening and on weekends to play cricket.

ANY UNFORGETTABLE TRAVEL MOMENTS THAT YOU RECALL?


Oh, yes! My wife plans all our trips and she has taken me to some very unusual places. Our trip to Antarctica was one of the most memorable. Seeing the huge icebergs and the cute penguins jumping was amazing; also the birds—the albatrosses on the islands. I wish I could go back. We also went to Rwanda to see the gorillas. Going on the Amarnath Yatra in Kashmir with our children was also an incredible experience.

WHAT ARE YOUR OTHER PASSIONS APART FROM MUSIC?

I love reading history books and have a huge collection of them. I also stay abreast of the political affairs of many countries.




gaggle of 24 cacophonous women, together for a school reunion, do not make particularly good guests for a safari. But here we are, in Jaipur, and one of the outings that's been planned is a trip to the Jhalana Leopard Reserve, India's first leopard reserve—surprisingly located within city limits. Our permits checked, we clamber into the jeeps, clad in camouflage colours, and suitably chastised to lower the noise levels.

Spread across around 20sq km, Jhalana only became a reserve in 2017. Prior to that, our guide Ganesh Prajapat from World of Wilders tells me, it was a protected area and private vehicles could drive into Jhalana for a minor fee. This inevitably led to loud music and littering, and was, therefore, stopped, post which it was declared a reserve. Did Jhalana always have a high concentration of leopards? Perhaps. But it was probably after the last tiger was shot in 1948 that the leopards started to thrive and became somewhat more visible. There are currently 35-40 of them (including cubs) spread across its three zones and the chances of sighting are high. Buoyed by this information, we set off, the jeeps dividing themselves between the zones to prevent overcrowding.

Jhalana is a dry, deciduous forest, overtaken by juliflora, which was initially planted so the villagers could get access to firewood but which rapidly spread, prohibiting the growth of most other flora and fauna. There are rocky hills, a dense scrub forest, and grasslands, but hopefully 24 pairs of eyes will be able to sight a leopard during the two-and-a-half-hour safari. After all, there are bragging rights to be had.

Our jeep first entered Zone 2. We manage to spot some interesting birds straight off—the Bay-backed shrike, also called the 'goggle' bird locally because it really looks like it has on a pair of sunnies; the jungle babblers who stick together in packs of seven; the pond heron with its distinguishable beak;



the Greater coucal, with the disproportionately long tail; and a huge number of peacocks and peahens. Ten minutes into the safari, one of the jeeps in our group catches up with us, telling us we just narrowly missed seeing one of the female leopards, Flora. She has descended from the hills and crossed over to the grasslands. Was she going in search of prey to feed her three cubs, born in October, or for a drink to one of the 15 man-made water bodies? We'd never know. The disappointment is real, and our driver Kuldeep Singh, one of the most experienced drivers at Jhalana, decides to turn around and go back to the entrance to retrace the route. Unfortunately, we have missed her.

Leopards are shy, nocturnal creatures, our guide says, and they ascend the rocks in the day to stay away from the other animals, only coming down towards the evening for water or a kill. He assures us that while there are no guarantees, the chances of sightings increase as the day draws to a close.

Holding on to that hope, we try to enthusiastically find pleasure in seeing the *nilgais* and the monkeys. We witness a peacock with its entire plumage fanned out, its body in full vibration, trying to attract a peahen.

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

We move into Zone 3 but here too, the leopard eludes us. Jaipur-based photographer Chinmaya Saxena, whom I catch up with later, is in another jeep, and tells me that there is a big difference in leopards existing at a place and actually being sighted. When I ask him if Rajasthan is India's leopard country (with Jawai, Nahargarh, Amagarh, and Narlai also reporting sightings), he tells me they can be seen here because

they are at the top of the food chain—there is no fear. In wildlife sanctuaries where the mighty tiger holds court, the leopard prefers to remain in the shadows.

Just then, one of the jeeps receives information that a female leopard can be seen on top of a rocky mountain in Zone 1. All jeeps hurriedly make their way, the excitement palpable. She's there alright but almost invisible to the naked eye. The head looks like a minute





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speck, until you look though the binoculars or a powerful professional camera lens. I see her through the latter but the minute I turn away from the camera, I see nothing. It's a sighting—and in the event that we don't see any other wild cats, it will be used to make the rest who backed out feel utterly jealous—but truth be told, it's not one worth writing home about.

We drive back towards the grasslands and our driver parks near a watering hole adjacent to a watch tower where sightings are more common. Patience and luck are the two things you need to spot an animal in the wild, he says. As he switches off the engine, we slump into silence and reflection, the jungle taking over us. It's hard to not fall under the mesmerising spell of the woods, and just an hour is also enough to wash away the city's jarring sounds. We're quiet and still, listening to the birds, muttering prayers under our breath, and just then, the driver signals for us to look. And there he is. Rana, one of the boldest leopards of Jhalana—because he's been seeing the jeeps since birth—just casually walks

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


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past across the water body about 100m from us. and moves towards the bushes, only his tail visible. Not a word escapes anyone's lips. We're almost in a trance. But Kuldeep isn't. He knows what route Rana will take and he's already driving us there.

Sure enough, he's bang on. Rana crosses the dirt track into the grasslands; by now, the news has been relayed and at least three other jeeps have caught up.



We are in front, stationary, with two jeeps behind us. In a second, Rana appears, walking right between our vehicles. He stops, stares at us, the eye contact sending a shiver down my spine, before proceeding to walk back towards the bushes. The next five to seven minutes are what make the entire safari worthwhile, as Rana, the son of 11-year-old Bahadur, the oldest leopard in Jhalana. puts on a grand show. He first sprays, marking his territory, then leads the way regally as all jeeps scramble to follow at a safe distance. He goes left into the bushes then emerges onto the track, then crosses over and comes out again. By now, the entire group is in a frenzy. People stand in excitement, are constantly reprimanded, and the jeeps jostle for space so all the guests can get a look. Forget the flex—genuine camaraderie takes over as everyone wants the others to get a glimpse of what

they have witnessed. We are truly reunited as we share this collective experience, and now when we meet again, we will have forged a new memory to add to our childhood ones. Rana has clearly won us over.

As we sit around a bonfire that night, I cannot help but think about how the mighty jungle has to do nothing to put you in your place, to remind you how insignificant you are in the larger scheme of things. It's just there, graciously standing tall, providing a home to so many creatures, and keeping the world together even as we do everything to pull it apart.











WALTZ THROUGH **VIENNA**

The Austrian capital is a rich treasure trove of cultural and gourmet delights

Rabindranath Tagore visited Vienna in 1921 and 1926. he apparently took a long and winding route. The

Nobel Laureate was believed to have travelled by train and reportedly took along several dozen pieces of baggage, besides an entourage of family and friends. Indians travel much lighter these days, of course.

On his first visit, it seems Tagore saw Richard Wagner's music drama Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg at the Vienna State Opera, dined with the Austrian President, delivered his The Religion of the Forest lecture at the University of Vienna, and read from his writings at a concert hall, donating the proceeds to help the children of the city as Austria was still reeling after World War I. On his second visit, he composed a song, Akashey tor temni acchey chhuti, besides meeting the father of

psychoanalysis, Sigmund Freud, and exploring the city.

Many Indians visiting Austria today may be inspired to compose a lyrical line or two as well, given its sheer variety of scenic and architectural beauty, not to mention cultural and culinary attractions. It's the land of lakes and the Alps, Mozart and Beethoven, The Sound of Music and Where Eagles Dare, dancing Lipizzaner horses and Gustav Klimt, Red Bull and Swarovski, Wiener Schnitzel and Sachertorte. The country was also the location for films like Tiger Zinda Hai and Where Harry Met Sejal.

For a first-time visitor—the shopping and dining hub of Stephansplatz, dominated by the grand 12th century St. Stephen's Cathedral, and the nearby grand Vienna State Opera should be starting points, to get the city's vibe. Hotel Sacher Vienna is a must-visit, as its long line of tourists

waiting for a taste of its iconic, chocolatey Sachertorte indicates. Hint: opt for a cocktail at the hotel's chic Blaue Bar to skip the queue as the famous cake is available there too.

If staving at one of the historic hotels along the Kärntner Strasse and **Ringstrasse** (as Tagore is said to have), most of the city's many legendary sights can be covered on foot, via a guided walking tour. These include the Maria-Theresien-Platz, the Parliament building, Burgtheater, the Austrian National Library, and more. The Habsburg heritage on display at the **Hofburg** and **Schönbrunn** palaces bedazzle as much as the treasures in the Kunsthistorisches Museum and the huge repository of artefacts, all in the same area.

Though a little further away, the Upper Belvedere Palace is unmissable as it boasts the largest collection of paintings of the artist whose presence

Best time to visit

Between April and October, but January has its own charm—no crowds at popular attractions, outdoor ice skating, and easy access to the city's famous cafés, minus the tourist rush. Plus, Russian and French artist Marc Chagall's exhibition will be on all of January and the Paul Gauguin exhibition will be on till 19th January.

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

is felt all over Vienna—Gustav Klimt besides Claude Monet and Vincent van Gogh, among others. Klimt's The Kiss has a Mona Lisa-like fan following and finds its way into all touristy memorabilia—from chocolates and mugs to cushion covers. Buying tickets online, beforehand, for this museum, is highly recommended.

Once the palaces and museums are done, explore Vienna's other delights. Start with Wiener Schnitzel (cutlets)



EASE OF ENTRY

The Vienna PASS is a card that gives visitors admission to over 90 attractions and access to the Fast Lanes at partner establishments. Public transport can be booked as an optional extra. This is available as a oneday, two-day, three-day, and six-day pass. Each holder is allowed to take one child up to 6 years of age with them for free. or **Käsespätzle** (Austrian cheese noodles), accompanied by a glass of **Gruner Veltliner** and **ApfelStrudel** for dessert. Or try a sausage from one of Vienna's famous *würstelstands* like Bitzinger, perhaps? Alternatively, a walk down the **Naschmarkt** with its 120 shops selling everything from clothes and incense to vegetables, fruits and food from around the world may be what you fancy.

For music aficionados, many concert venues organise programmes featuring some of the best works of Mozart, Beethoven, Strauss, and others. If the weather's good, have a Viennese coffee, saunter around **Prater** park, and take a ride on the Riesenrad (Giant Ferris Wheel). Also visit a heuriger or wine tavern at one of Vienna's several vineyards. Buy a delicate Augarten Wein porcelain bauble or, better still, pick up a schneekugel or snow globe, which was invented in Vienna.

In 1932, another famous Indian visited Austria: Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose spent time in Vienna, and his half-Austrian daughter, Anita, was born here. Maybe he walked down the same boulevards and lingered in the Prater. That is certainly a thought to ponder as you take in a city that has always had something to interest and captivate every kind of visitor.















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

Mattancherry Dutch Palace

Built around 1545, the palace was gifted by the Portuguese to the then king of Kochi. It is closed on Fridays to visitors. Across the road are the old spice warehouses, where one can buy fresh pepper, vanilla pods, and more. They make for great souvenirs.

① 12:00PM Lunch by the sea

Armoury Cafe

This sea-facing eatery is housed in Brunton Boatyard, a former shipyard from colonial times that is now a luxury hotel. Savour traditional Kerala dishes, including appam, vegetable stew and fish, and meat delicacies while watching the Indian Navy and cargo ships sail by in the shimmering waters.

A few streets away is VJ Prabhu, which is known for its fine, cotton saris, especially the traditional white-andgold kasavu as well as Kanjeevaram silks.


The Sacred Lotus

Air India has placed an order to purchase 100 more Airbus aircraft, comprising 10 widebody A350 and 90 narrowbody A320 Family aircraft, including A321neo. These 100 new aircraft are in addition to the firm orders of 470 aircraft that Air India had placed with Airbus and Boeing in 2023. The latest order takes the total number of aircraft that Air India has ordered to 570, reiterating its commitment to building a modern airline that India can be proud of.



GIVING WINGS TO DREAMS

Air India has placed an order for 34 trainer aircraft as it prepares to start training of cadet pilots at South Asia's largest Flying Training Organisation (FTO) coming up in Amravati, Maharashtra. This reaffirms the airline's commitment towards strengthening the aviation ecosystem and cultivating a strong talent pool of pilots.




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Air India has extended its wireless inflight entertainment service. Vista Stream, to its narrowbody fleet. Vista Stream, which debuted in August 2024, has already been introduced across Air India's widebody fleet (excluding the newlyinducted Boeing 777 and Airbus 350 aircraft). It will be accessible across international and domestic networks.

AIR INDIA WINS A RED DOT AWARD

Air India has won global recognition for its generative Artificial Intelligence-driven booking feature which, once rolled out, will greatly enhance the reservation experience. Air India's innovative concept recently won the Red Dot award, one of the most prestigious recognitions for design concepts by the global design community, in Singapore. This concept is now showcased in the city's Red Dot Design Museum.



OPTIMISATION OF ROUTES

Following the integration of Vistara in November 2024, Air India optimised its domestic route network, prioritising deployment of its best narrowbody cabin products on five key metro-to-metro routes, from 1st December 2024. All* flights between the following metro cities are being operated with the erstwhile Vistara A320-series aircraft, offering Business, Premium Economy, and Economy Class: Delhi and Mumbai; Delhi and Bengaluru; Delhi and Hyderabad; Mumbai and Bengaluru; and Mumbai and Hyderabad.



BENEFITS GALORE FOR STUDENTS

Air India has launched discounted fares and additional benefits for students across its domestic and international route network applicable for all three cabins. These benefits provide students up to 10 per cent discount on base fares on all flights, 10kg extra baggage allowance, and the option of a onetime free date change upon booking on Air India's direct channels.

*Air India will continue to operate one widebody flight each between Delhi and Mumbai, Bengaluru, and Hyderabad using its Boeing 777 or Airbus A350 aircraft, which will have 'AI'-prefixed three-digit flight numbers.







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


