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THE MAN WHO GAVE WINGS TO OUR DREAMS

We pay tribute to the illustrious Ratan Tata, whose passion for aviation knew no bounds

true visionary, Ratan Tata may no longer be with us, but he will always hold a cherished place in our hearts and memories. He was Chairman of the Tata Group and the Tata Trusts for several years. He was the face of Indian industry worldwide and a mentor to young India. But above all, he was a proud Indian, who gave wings to our dreams.

Even as Tata pursued pathbreaking, pioneering initiatives in his career and championed social causes with missionary zeal, there were two passions that stayed close to him—his love for aircraft and cars. His passion for flying dated from his childhood, when a small model plane was one of his favourite possessions.

Later, when he was a student at Cornell University in the US, Tata obtained his first pilot's licence. Lessons were expensive, so he earned some of the money required for this by washing planes. A few of his initial flights around Ithaca, where Cornell University is located, were filled with adventure. These student-day sorties appear to have cemented his passion for the skies.

This fervour would keep reappearing at so many points in his life. In 2007, at 69, Tata became the oldest Indian to fly an F-16 aircraft at the Aero India show in Bengaluru. The iconic image of Tata boarding the F-16 has been, for millions of young Indians, an inspiring 'Top Gun' moment. Move over, Tom Cruise.

Later, in 2022, despite being unwell

and at the advanced age of 85, he used an ambu-lift to board an Airbus 350, the long-range plane that Air India was then in the process of acquiring. An A350 had arrived in Mumbai for a demo flight. Tata went to the flight deck and sat on the jump seat behind the pilots. He experienced the flight for 40 minutes and appeared to have thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

One of the defining points of Tata's life was also centred on aviation. This was the Tata Group's re-acquisition of Air India in 2022, nearly 70 years after it had been nationalised by the Government. Here was an airline that had originally been founded by JRD Tata, coming back home. Nothing could have given Tata greater joy.

When this acquisition was announced in 2021, Tata had said in a statement: "On an emotional note, Air India, under the leadership of Mr JRD Tata, had, at one time, gained the reputation of being one of the most prestigious airlines in the world. Tatas will have the opportunity of regaining the image and reputation it enjoyed in earlier years. JRD Tata would have been overjoyed if he was in our midst today."

Later, when the Tata Group had assumed ownership of Air India, Tata recorded a very special welcome message for all passengers onboard the airline. He said, "The Tata Group







welcomes Air India's new customers and is excited to work together to make Air India the airline of choice in terms of passenger comfort and service."

At the Tata Group and Air India, we believe that the greatest homage that we can pay to Ratan Tata is to fulfil this vision—to make Air India a worldclass airline that always delivers the very best to its passengers. Air India's Vihaan.Al initiative is dedicated to exactly this objective.

Ratan Tata is no more with us today. But at Air India, his memory lives on in our aircraft, every day, on every single flight. He continues to inspire us to deliver the very best to all of you who have chosen to fly with us. We are committed to make our nation proud by fulfilling his dreams for Air India.

A WARM WEAVE

Delve into the art of crafting pashmina wool, with locals, in the awe-inspiring landscape of Ladakh

hen the sun begins to set, the village

of Kharnak, in Ladakh's Changthang Valley, 15,000ft above sea level, comes to life. Hundreds of Changras, the goats that grow pashmina wool on their bellies, descend from the mountains after a long day of searching for green pastures. Once the goats are in their pens, the women of the semi-nomadic Changpa tribe show us hand-spun pashmina and sheep skeins. They use the latter to weave their clothes but the delicate pashmina is sent to Leh to be made into finer clothing.

I follow these threads to slow-textile label Lena Ladakh Pashmina's workshop, where I learn the art of dyeing and weaving the soft cashmere wools. I throw in pashmina and camel wool threads into boiling marigold dye, soak them with excitement, and then wash the excess in water. After quick rounds of hot *kahwa* (a traditional saffron-infused beverage), I get ready to weave.

I pass my long, threaded needle up and down alternative strings of my frame. Weaving, I realise, is hard work but equally soothing and meditative. I can feel my breathing slow down and, gradually, the world around me dissolves. I even forget to check my phone for hours, a big win.

Later, looking back, I realise that this moment also perfectly encapsulates the experience of Ladakh. This region teaches you to be in the present, to be in awe of nature yet one with it. Finally, as I contemplate my creation, I find that it will help me bookmark this adventure and cherish the smaller joys of life.



Ladakh is best visited from April to July, but **winter** allows travellers to enjoy the **Chadar Trek** and snow leopard safaris.

FINE CATCH

Discover the ancient practice of pearl farming in a middle-eastern haven, Ras Al Khaimah

he air felt cool against my face as our wooden boat set sail from Ras Al Khaimah through the waters of the Arabian Gulf. The boat felt like a relic from another era, the sea beneath us a constant shifting canvas of blue. Our destination was a floating platform, with a pearl diving boat of yore anchored behind it.

This was Suwaidi Pearls, the world's only and Arab's first modern pearl farm, established by Abdulla Rashed Al Suwaidi in 2004. It looked unassuming but the history it carried was profound. Long before oil defined the Arabian Gulf, pearls were the region's most precious commodity. For thousands of years, pearl divers risked their lives for the chance to uncover these sought-after gems. But with the rise of cultured pearls, the industry nearly vanished. Suwaidi, descended from generations of pearl divers, revived this heritage with a new, modern approach sustainable farming.

"Pearl diving was a way of life," our guide Obaid said, as he walked us through the history of this ancient trade. "Divers would spend months at sea, surviving on dates

and coffee, risking their lives with every dive."

Obaid showed us the different types of pearl oysters, the various grades of pearls, and how these oysters are cultivated here, nurtured in baskets that rest on the seafloor, growing alongside coral reefs and other marine life. It's a delicate balance between preserving the ocean's ecosystem and continuing the craft that has sustained this region for millennia.

He then asked for a volunteer, and when I eagerly stepped ahead, he handed me a small knife. With careful precision, I pried the shell open. Inside, I felt a smooth, hard object beneath the oyster's soft tissue—a pearl. "You're lucky," Obaid smiled. "Only 60 per cent of farmed oysters produce a pearl."



As I held the shiny white gem in the palm of my hand, it was more than just a discovery. It felt like I had touched a piece of history, connected to the countless divers who had done the same centuries before. But this was not just about the pearls. It was about preserving a legacy, ensuring that future generations can experience the lost culture of pearl diving in a way that respects the delicate balance of the sea.

is best known for, Ephedra turned out to be a joyous culinary experience beyond anything I could have ever imagined.

On my five-course vegan tasting menu were wild herbs and flowers foraged from the desert, and veggies sourced from local communities. There was kombucha brewed with the suico flower, which grows wild only when it rains (a rarity in this expanse); native purple potato chips; a sorbet made of desert herbs like rica rica; and my favouritethe desert-inspired dessert of vegan macarons textured like the rugged mountains we could see out of the window.

Every course was also accompanied by stories of this region, some borrowed from co-founder Carolina's grandmother's kitchen and some from her own

adventures in curating meals for travellers like us.

As I ended my repast, I delivered my verdict: the food was extremely creative, delicious, and deserving of a Michelin star.

Finally. I reflected on how this meal was a true ode to the communities that have thrived for centuries in the world's highest, driest, and oldest desert. This produced a strange sense of bliss—knowing that this moment would stay with me as a precious memory that I would cherish forever.

Millions of visitors from across the globe come here to soak up the festive spirit.

My exhilarating adventure began as soon as elves led me to a dimlylit passageway lined with presents. After ascending a few stairs, I spotted the bearded man sitting on a large wooden chair, surrounded by books, maps, and a trunk full of letters from fans. With a big smile, he welcomed me with a jolly, "Ho, ho, ho; welcome to the Arctic Circle."

Next door, inside the post office, I wrote postcards to my loved ones back home, sharing the exciting experience I just had. All mails are stamped with the special Arctic Circle postmark and you can have it delivered right away or just before Christmas.

Once we wrapped up this popular activity, we moved on to the ultimate spectacle, witnessing the Northern Lights. The clear inland air in this area makes it one of the best places in the world to witness the Aurora Borealis, nature's greatest light



GETTING THERE

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BEST TIME TO VISIT

The Northern Lights are visible from **late** August to early April. Statistically, the lights are visible on every second night. But the nights need to be dark enough to catch a glimpse of this magical phenomenon. display. On an unbearably chilly night in Levi (a twohour drive from Rovaniemi and 170km above the Arctic Circle), we drove away from the city lights, in search of the aurora while listening to numerous mythical tales from our guide. Then we waited in anticipation for the brilliant colours to creep across the sky.

Totally layered up, we stayed in the car till we got the signal to step out. Initially, there were faint streaks of green, pink, and purple in the sky, that turned more magical and dramatic with time, as if performing a happy dance. Each flash lasted anywhere from a few

it imperative for us to pay close attention to our wellbeing. Finding foods that are mood-boosting can help support one's emotional balance. Appropriate meals not only nourish the body but also sustain the mind, improving concentration and creating a positive attitude. Here are some options to help brighten up your day.

DARK CHOCOLATE

This treat triggers pleasure chemicals, or endorphins, responsible for satisfaction. Chocolate also contains serotonin—a chemical that has properties associated with enhancing one's state of mind and sleep. As an added ingredient, cocoa powder has antioxidants that is known to increase cognitive function. However, it is recommended to eat dark chocolate with at least 70 per cent cocoa content.

FERMENTED FOODS

Options like yoghurt, idli, and kimchi are probiotic in nature, which help to maintain the balance of gut bacteria. The gut is particularly important in the synthesis of serotonin and studies suggest that a balanced digestion can reduce stress levels.

BANANAS

This fruit plays an important role as a perfect source of tryptophan. The amino acid

is converted to serotonin in the brain and, as a result, is said to help alleviate depression. Bananas also contain Vitamin B6, essential for neurotransmitter synthesis, that promotes brain function.

LEAFY GREENS

Vegetables like spinach, fenugreek leaves, mustard greens, and amaranth leaves are rich in magnesium. Lack of magnesium has been linked to anxiety and depression. They are also rich in folate, which helps in the production of dopamine, a chemical that is proven to improve memory and mood. You can also consume these local greens in the form of dried powders or in smoothies.

BERRIES

Blueberries, strawberries, and other berries are a rich source of antioxidants that can reduce the level of oxidative stress on the brain. They are high in Vitamin C, known to lower levels of anxiety. Regular consumption has also been associated with better cognitive ability.

NUTS AND SEEDS

A handful of almonds, walnuts, and flaxseeds all said to be good for brain health—may contain more magnesium, zinc, and healthy fats than one can imagine. Zinc helps in the functioning of neurotransmitters, which is believed to reduce symptoms of depression. Omega-3 and omega-6 fatty acids in nuts also promote emotional stability.

WHOLE GRAINS

Oats and quinoa provide steady energy and help regulate blood sugar levels. They also contain Vitamin B complex, especially B6.

AVOCADOS

This wonder fruit provides healthy monounsaturated fats that are essential for the brain. It also contains folate and Vitamin E, which can reduce the risk of anxiety. Additionally, Vitamin B5, helpful in the production of neurotransmitters, is found in this super food.

HOW DO DIFFERENT MEDIUMS IMPACT YOU AS AN ACTOR?

Each medium—film, stage or TV has its characteristics that fulfil me in different ways. But in theatre, I find a direct connection with the audience. It is nerve-wracking but also gratifying. Receiving a heartfelt standing ovation in theatre is the greatest joy.

WHAT LED YOU TO OPEN A CAFÉ IN KESENNUMA, JAPAN?

This café arose out of my need to do something after the 2011 setback that Japan faced off its north-eastern coast. I had made friends here, who made me realise that a place where people could gather and share the spirit of community was needed. Entire towns on the shorelines had

It brings me happiness WHEN I AM AT HOME, I COOK WHAT MY HEART DESIRES."

t 8.30am, the sun was bright but the slight chill in the air had not yet abated. Mist danced on lush grass even as purple floss sprouted from moss-laden stone walls; tiny birds hopped at a distance and butterflies flitted from flower to flower.

Whenever life gets too much to handle, I run to the hills. Breathing in clean air and listening to quietness is my way to rejuvenate. And a trip to Abbotsford Villa, a heritage homestay perched high above Nainital, was an

attempt to do just that. I instantly felt at home on the 150-year-old estate, because of my familiarity with these mountains and because of my host, Janhavi. She not only opened her home to me but also shared many stories about the town-why the church of St John in the Wilderness continues to be revered, why the Boat House Club is the ultimate hotspot, and more. Inspired by her tales, I decided to waste no time in visiting these attractions.

Standing amidst a dense thicket, St John's, the oldest

church here, was my first stop. While I found it locked, imagining the place in its glory was both calming and touching. Next, I headed to the boat club, amongst the oldest in India. While I do not know how to sail, observing the iconic Linton Hope Half Rater (a historic sailing craft) from close quarters and watching the colourful masts flutter against the glistening Naini Lake was a sight to behold. The day ended perfectly with a Kumaoni meal of aloo ke gutke, bhat ki dal, homestyle chicken

and mutton curries, and traditional pahadi raita, all made in-house.

On my second morning, I planned to do other thingsbut only after a leisurely breakfast of house specials like Nainital toast, apple pie, and neembu saan (a traditional salad made with pomelo and hemp seeds). First though, I settled down to some reading in the sun. Sprawled on the lawn, I flipped through a vintage National Geographic, read Jim Corbett's adventures, and drifted into a sweet slumber.





When I woke up, a lunch of salad and soup was waiting for me, after which I stepped out for a stroll.

Bathed in the tranquil air, I strolled beneath the deodars and pines along the winding lanes, admiring homes with lace curtains and flowerpots, finally reaching the charming Bara Bazaar. It is home to all the things I love—handmade sweaters, hand-poured candles, and handcrafted toys. I spent the afternoon browsing through oldfashioned shops and filling my bags with mittens, socks, books, toy boats, pickles, and fruit cordials.

It was late evening by the time I returned home, to find a bonfire ready for me. I sank down next to it, listening to the crickets, observing the constellations, and warming my chilly hands. I felt calmer and happier than I had been in months. That was when I realised how just two days of 'me time' in the hills had completely relaxed and replenished my soul. And I felt glad that I had one more day to myself—for doing more of what I love.

MUST KNOW The Hay Festival Winter

Weekend is on this year from 28th November to 1st December. The main eponymous Festival is held over 10 days in the months of **May and June**. t was a chilly morning in Wales, the country referred to as *Cymru* in Welsh. With childlike enthusiasm, I woke up and headed straight out with my iPhone gripped firmly in my hand to capture as much as I could of this neighbourhood, including my hotel, **Llangoed Hall**. This 23-room country house is reminiscent of a *Downton Abbey*-style estate and has the most intriguing past; it is believed to have been the site of the first Welsh parliament in 560AD.

I was not only excited to document my picturesque surroundings but was also looking forward to heading to the next destination, **Hay-on-Wye**. Renowned as the 'Town of Books', it beckons bibliophiles and wanderers alike. Little did I know that my visit would be the beginning of a transformative journey, where a seemingly minor setback would lead to a profound shift in perspective.

As I eagerly set foot in Hay-on-Wye, my heart brimmed with excitement at the prospect of immersing myself in its literary wonders. Yet, fate had other plans in store. In a moment of clumsy haste, my phone slipped from my grasp and its camera shattered upon impact with the cobblestone pavement. In a matter of minutes, my happiness turned into anguish and frustration threatened to cloud my spirits.

In that moment, I realised how our modern lives hide behind our phone cameras. We have forgotten to find happiness in the beauty surrounding us through the natural lens of our eyes. We tend to edit everything we capture Cardiff Central Market sells all the local specialties of the area

on our phones to make it look better and appealing, but, after all, does that filter even provide the joy we are longing for? With these deep thoughts, I gathered the courage to embark on a strangely joyful exploration of this country.

Freed from the constant distraction of technology and with renewed excitement, I set off on a journey of discovery that transcended the boundaries of mere sightseeing. Immediately after the incident, I headed to Hay Castle, a historic fortification in the small town of Hay-on-Wye in Powys. The open-air Honesty Bookshop tucked away here has no employees and no till; book lovers can select the book of their choice and drop a payment of £1 for any book into a little black box. I then went on to explore some interesting bookstores: Murder and Mayhem, Richard Booth's Bookshop, Gay on Wye, The Poetry Bookshop, Hay Cinema Bookshop, and many others. They all made me fall in love with the town even more. This leisurely bookbrowsing spree was followed by a cup of hot coffee at a quaint café.

Soon, I became comfortable with my new way of exploring the region. Before I even realised, I was enjoying the lush green expanse of **Brecon Beacons National Park**, officially the **Bannau Brycheiniog National Park**, which boasts walking trails and other outdoor activities. It is also home to the first International Dark Sky reserve in Wales. I discovered myself talking to strangers and striking up meaningful conversations about weather; undoubtedly, this is the most soughtafter conversation starter in the UK, alongside food, places, and life.

Next on the itinerary was Talgarth



Mill near the town of Crickhowell. Nestled on the banks of the Ellywe river that flows from the Black Mountains, this fully-restored and functional waterpowered mill from the 18th century took me back in time. I learned the history of milling, and viewed the current functioning of the mill and its part in the community. The location, reminiscent of a bygone era, also maintains a beautiful garden alongside the river which is perfect for a leisurely stroll to soak in the slow life of the town. As I had a freshly prepared lunch at their bakery and café—The Baker's Table—I found myself savouring the beauty of history, community, nature, and food.

Meanwhile, in the charming town of Abergavenny, I discovered the joy of genuine human connection. This is a lively market town known for its artisanal crafts. The town houses one such shop which is famous for its hat collection, Alison Tod, situated next to The Angel Hotel. While the brand has attracted a host of famous names (including that of Golda Rosheuvel who plays Queen Charlotte in the hit Netflix series Bridgerton), I will always remember it for its warm and welcoming staff. We engaged in heartfelt conversations, sharing myriad stories as I tried on various hats. They also drew a map for me to visit a couple of interesting stores down the street.

Without immediately posting them on Instagram, I felt a cheerful connection with the people and

places around me, forging bonds that surpassed the boundaries of virtual interaction. Not to mention, I ended up buying two woolly hats, souvenirs that I happily brought home for my daughter from Wales.

By the time I reached **Cardiff**, I had fully embraced my phone-free state. In this bustling capital city, I indulged in sumptuous delights of the local fare. I was taken on a culinary sojourn by Sian Roberts, the founder of Loving Welsh Food, a company offering food tours in Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan. We started our tasting spree at Wally's Delicatessen & Kaffeehaus, where I enjoyed a variety of cheeses and a charcuterie board. Further, I tasted cawl (a traditional broth or stew of meat and vegetables), faggots (meatballs), laver bread (a dish prepared with seaweed), cockles (clams), and my favourite, the popular Welsh cake.

I must admit I was bowled over by the array of flavours and textures, and couldn't help but devour not only the food but the stories behind each dish, along with the cultural significance each one holds. Take for instance, Glamorgan sausages, which don't contain any meat at all and are named after the historic county of Glamorgan. These cheesy, veggie croquettes made with breadcrumbs became popular during World War II when meat was hard to





come by. They are mostly made with tangy Caerphilly or cheddar cheese these days. This time, I reflected; I had truly savoured the culinary experience as I engaged all my senses.

And then came the time to bid goodbye to Wales. As I prepared to leave, my broken phone sitting uselessly in my bag, in fact, brought a big smile to my face. I had found something far more valuable than any social media photo or post—the joy of being present, of truly connecting with a place and with myself. Without a shred of doubt, this time I carried with me memories captured beyond just mere pixels. A newfound appreciation for the beauty of authentic experiences and genuine human connections engulfed me. I finally realised that I was led on a journey of self-discovery, teaching myself to embrace the present moment with open arms and a heart full of gratitude and bliss.

In Cymru, I learned that true happiness lies not in the pursuit of virtual validation but in the richness of life's simple pleasures. And for that, I will forever be grateful to this quaint, beautiful destination, where an unexpected twist set me on a path of joy, thrill, and sheer enlightenment.
